

"Reconciliation and Truth-Telling, After the Voice Referendum"

Date: Thursday, May 23, 2024 at 10 am (One hour presentation followed by Q&A session)

Professor Andrew Gunstone is a leading authority on reconciliation. He is Associate Deputy Vice-Chancellor Reconciliation and Professor Indigenous Studies at Federation University, where he established and leads the National Centre for Reconciliation, Truth and Justice. He is also Co-Chair of Reconciliation Victoria and sits on several national reconciliation committees.

INTRODUCING OUR COMMITTEE This month featuring our Secretary – Heather Sherwell

My father was working as a fruit picker in Shepparton, when I was born. I was three years old when my family moved to Carrum Downs where my father built a successful poultry farming business. Both my parents, my two brothers, my sister and I were all very involved on the poultry farm collecting, cleaning, weighing, sorting and packing eggs. Eventually the farm was automated and much of the intensive labour was done by machine.

I attended Carrum Downs Primary School, Dandenong Girls' Secondary School and Frankston Teachers' College. Upon completing my teaching Diploma, I started my career as a Primary teacher. I pursued further education at Deakin University, receiving a Graduate Diploma - Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages. In my teaching career, spanning 40+ years, I undertook a variety of positions including Library teacher, Head Teacher of a one-teacher school and teaching Design and Technology studies in a Secondary school. My final position was at the Noble Park English Language School, teaching English to newly-arrived migrants or refugees from countries such as Africa and Afghanistan and finally joining the school management team, leading Curriculum Development.

I was inspired to be a teacher when I entered the education system as a five-year old and was taught by an amazing Prep teacher, Miss Opie. I loved teaching and was always busy as a committed teacher, dedicated to my students. It was a career that offered advantages that suited my life-style choices, as well. I had two children who both attended the Primary school where I was teaching. During the school holidays we enjoyed family four-wheel driving and camping trips, exploring Australia. I now have two lovely grandchildren who enjoy visiting my Pakenham property, exploring the bush and watching the native birds and animals in the environment around us.

When I retired from teaching, I found I finally had the time to further pursue my interests; astronomy, photography, bird watching, travelling and learning French. I discovered that U3A Cardinia offered a French course and thus started my association with U3A, also joining the Astronomy course and the Walking group. I became a passionate facilitator of the First Nations class after expressing an interest in the course. I have happily taken on the role of Secretary this year, after volunteering to assist Heike in the Office last year.

The role of Secretary is stimulating and rewarding. I am thoroughly enjoying working alongside the team of dedicated volunteers who strive to provide further education for our members in a range of creative, social and leisure activities.
